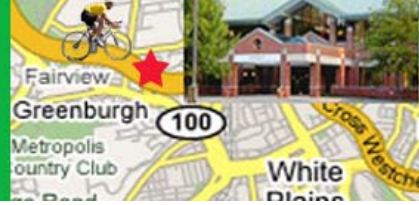

Flood Report and Jazz Concert Schedule

Dear Greenburgh Citizen,

This April's flood inflicted severe damage to our central shopping hub on East Hartsdale Avenue, and I am sending this letter as an update about our response.

Eight inches of rain fell during the storm, overwhelming major drainage systems and overflowing a nearby stream. Many stores on the west side of the Avenue were closed, and residents of two apartment buildings at 170 and 180 East Hartsdale Avenue were evacuated and unable to return for a week.

Constituent service has always been one of my fortes, and, after the flood, I spent many long hours responding to the needs of individual businesses and homeowners alike. Many of you contacted my office for assistance, and I've reached out proactively to several impacted neighborhoods. I continue to work with affected parties on a daily basis as several stores are still facing difficulties.

Subsequent to the immediate aftermath, **coordination with FEMA for disaster relief, waiving unnecessary legal requirements to help businesses re-open, and repairing town infrastructure** created a second-tier of emergency items. Together, with the Town Board, we are proceeding in a non-partisan manner to address these issues.

We are also pursuing the creation of a drainage district, jazz concerts and sidewalk sales on East Hartsdale Avenue to revitalize pedestrian traffic, and an independent study to suggest ways to protect our town from a future deluge. In case some locations remain vacant, I will also suggest a temporary library branch.

In addition to these ongoing efforts, I have used the storm as an opportunity to re-consider the town's development and think of creative and practical steps we can propose for Greenburgh as a whole.

You may recall a recent newsletter from my office titled, "**The Big Picture.**" The re-building engendered by the flood should be integrated with an overall vision for our town's development. I believe, by working together, we can create an even better Greenburgh and would be honored to continue as your Supervisor as we do so.

I respectfully ask for your vote based on my decades of service and innovation for our community, and my unflinching efforts to assist every single resident and business affected by this emergency.
